A recent meeting with the city reaffirmed that the Fire Engine House will indeed be put up for sale, probably in the not too distant future. The request was again made to have the building retained by the city and leased to the Society. The Society will in all likelihood not be in a position to pay market value now or in the near future for the building and build a fund for sustainability.

There is a hope that when planning for a building on the coal dock, consideration be given to including a maritime museum that the Society



would help manage. That would help determine what the Society needs in a permanent location.

The Capital Fund Campaign, **Preserving** our Past Building our Future, has planned a kick off on April 8th in conjunction with the publication of a book on the history of Port Washington. Mailings have gone out to members, nonmembers and businesses.

Fundraising so far has generated \$12, 911.

If you have already given, we heartedly thank you. If you have not given, please consider what you can give. If you can give over several years, we can accommodate that. Our short term goal for the end of 2011 is \$75,000. That gives us credibility and allows us to generate momentum.

Maritime Heritage Festival August 19-21, 2011

This year's Festival promises to bring new excitement to Port Washington.

Rick Smith agreed to give his slide presentation on the "History of Port's Harbor" that he developed for a presentation to the Manitowoc Maritime Museum. The presentation will be accompanied by artifacts, photos, maps, and documents on the harbor history. Rick will present once each day, Friday through Sunday, in the meeting room of the lower level of the Holiday Inn.



Did you know that Port's harbor is the first man made harbor on the Great Lakes? In 1870 the federal government allotted \$192,527.00 for the development of an artificial harbor – our historical harbor. Plan to attend one of these programs - and please spread the word – and come learn more about our maritime history.

This year canoes will land on the shores of the lake with fur trader and earlier settler reenactors. The Historical Society is working on being involved in recreation of those events.

The Light Station 2011 Season

The 1860 Light Station Museum will open May 14th - Saturdays 11 - 4 and Sundays noon – 4. Groups can schedule weekday tours as well. A new Generator Building display welcomes visitors and new touches have been added throughout the grounds. Remember, Historical Society members have free admission.

Co-Director Rick Smith replaced outdoor signage, repainted walls, ceilings, tower ladders, floors and landings. Rick handled office duties including group tour reservations and handling email and phone inquiries as that Linda Nenn is working through illness.

Once again, the Light Station is in need of volunteer docents. Anyone age 16 or older may help and no experience is necessary. Tour guide



handbooks and guidelines as well as in person training help prepare volunteers.

Of our original tour guides, only Elaine Nulph, Alice Horton and Marianne Kartheiser remain, willing AND able to volunteer many weekdays and weekends. Leroy Bley continues with group tours and occa-

sional impromptu tour requests. Thankfully others have stepped into the breach, but our Society membership relies on so few, year after year, to donate so much of their time. A small commitment of 10 hours a month makes a difference.

Light Station Restoration Needs

1. The tower parapet wood railing and posts must be completely replaced with milled hardwood or a manufactured wood product instead of the pine used in the 2002 re-creation. The mortise and tendon crowned railing, lower and vertical spacers as well as the routed and capped corner newel posts have cracked and rotted through, victims of Wisconsin weather and wood that dried and shrank after construction. Despite layers of paint, wood filler and installation of angle reinforcements, portions of the railing blew off the building in 2010 and were temporarily repaired.

The Challenge: The corner newel posts are anchored within the platform structure that was designed and built in two halves, rather than post and beam used in the original structure. It was the only way the platform could be built in Luxembourg and then broken apart for shipping. Once the two halves were bolted together and lifted into place, reasonable access was lost.

Materials and milling: \$4000-\$5000. In-

stallation cost may run as high as \$5000 if scaffolding of tower is required and underside platform boards have to be removed. No contractor has yet expressed interest in bidding on the job.

2. Replacement of exterior lighthouse doors. Current doors were custom built and donated by Stallion Doors, St. Cloud, MN. The company does not build exterior doors, but the Restoration was very pleased to receive Stallion's offer to custom build and donate all the 5 panel doors, two with windows. Since 2002, we've insulated the kitchen and front doors with Styrofoam and plastic. But the doors now have major cracks and have to be replaced. New, exterior, oversized, custom 5 panel solid oak door are expected to cost \$2000. New, exterior kitchen and back lighthouse doors with 4 true divided, panes of insulated glass is expected to cost \$2500-\$3000.

UPDATE ON THE FIRST NATIONAL BANK AND BUSINESS MEN'S CLUB

At a special meeting of the Common Council in February the vote to proceed with the razing of these two buildings was put on hold. And that is the continued status of the buildings.

The PWHS sent packets to all of the council members, the city administrator, and the Mayor including detailed information on the history of these two buildings. A letter was included from the Board of Directors pleading to not demolish these two historically significant buildings. Members are asked to contacting their city officials

regarding the preservation of these buildings.

Reality predicts that the "end user" will determine the fate. Will someone step forward and purchase these buildings and use the historic tax credits to restore them? Or is the value of the land, minus the buildings, a better option for the "end user?" The city continues to encourage the

building's owners to work with potential buyers to restore and save these buildings.

It is the continued hope that the "end user" and owners will keep the historic buildings as part of the landscape of Franklin Street. The

beauty of the downtown's stately buildings is an attribute for residents of Port Washington as well as a major draw for visitors, especially those doing our Historic Walking Tour. Razing these two historically important buildings greatly diminishes that feature of Franklin Street and Port Washington.


