### **OZAUKEE COUNTY AND THE CIVIL WAR**

The Quarterly Meeting of the Port Washington Historical Society will be at the Port Washington Senior Center, 403 West Foster Street, Port Washington, on Wednesday, July 16. Besides street parking there is limited parking in the lot to the west of the building arrived at via the alley between Foster and Michigan Streets.

will be served. The public is invited.

Port Washington was made infamous as the site of the Civil War Draft Riot on November 10, 1862, however Ozaukee County's young men played an important role in fighting for the Union 150 years ago. Allen Buchholz, First Vice-president of the Ozaukee **County Historical** Society and board member of the Luxembourg American Cultural Society, has

acquired much information about the hundreds of Ozaukee county men who fought for the Union in the Civil War. Some of you may have seen the artifacts that were on display at the Commemoration of the Draft Riot at the Ozaukee County Courthouse in 2012.

Through a slide presentation Buchholz will give insights into the experiences of some of the brave men who represented Ozaukee County. You may be familiar with some of the names that he will mention: Blake, Towsley, Bichler, and Taylor from

Port Washington; McGinley and Gouge from Saukville; and Antoine, Kiefer, and Johann from Belgium.

Buchholz will highlight Edward Blake whose father Barnum Blake, in 1852, constructed the

building which is now the home of the Port Washington Historical Society. A photo of Edward Blake, the flag bearer, is exhibited at the Resource Center as a gift from the Howard Bostwick Family, descendants of Blake.

### **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED**

### **Light Station: Greeters and Tour Guides Needed**

The need continues to find more volunteers to fill these positions at the Light Station. The more greeters and guides we sign on, the fewer hours each of our volunteers will have to work each month. If necessary, we are happy to split shifts so no one needs to work a full 4-or 5-hour shift. We are happy to accommodate volunteers who do not want to give tours to the tower/lantern room—some of our guides give tours of the first floor and then another guide takes over for the tower tour.

The Light Station is open Friday, Saturday, and Sunday afternoons Memorial Day through October. Two to four guides are needed on a given day. Guides are requested to be available two or more days a month. Information and training are provided. Please contact Kathie Gordon at 262-268-9734 if you are interested. It's a great opportunity to meet visitors to the community.

#### **Resource Center:**

The building is open Monday, Thursday, and Friday 1-4 and Saturdays 10-2, Spring through Fall. Greeters

are needed in the exhibit areas to answer questions and supervise the first floor areas and gift shop. Training is provided. Archive work can be done when there are no guests in the building.

Cleaning the building once a week is needed: vacuum carpet and wood floors, dust exhibit areas, clean the bathroom, and occasionally clean windows. You can pick a task.

Archive work: photocopy articles and photos, file photocopied pieces, catalog information on collections, and fulfill research requests.

Database work: maintain databases for filing cabinets, shelves, and collections.


Special Event Planning: help create, organize, and stage a summer or fall event.

His imagination was captured by the vision of the Exploreum, so he offered a donation of \$1,000. As we talked more about the future, he decided increase his gift to \$3,000 over three years.

Several months ago, Mary Flierl and I made a presentation to the Ozaukee Historical Society. Afterwards we were handed \$20 dollar bills from two in the audience. They said they couldn't believe this was happening in Port Washington, and although it was not in Cedarburg, they wanted to support it.

Every one of these gifts is special—each helps us to reach our goals. And most importantly, each donor, just like PWSB, invested in the future.

A recent Ozaukee Press editorial stated, "The society is also counting on – and deserves – the support of the people of the Port Washington area, contributions of any amount from families that want to be part of this bold initiative to elevate the appreciation of the community's history to a new level."

Each of you reading this newsletter cares about Port's past and its future. Each of you belongs in the Port Exploreum.

### **MODEL OF BRIG NIAGARA DONATED**

The brig Niagara was the second flagship of Commodore Oliver Hazard Perry in the Battle of Lake Erie in the War of 1812. In this battle on September 10, 1813, Commo-

dore Perry's first flagship was destroyed by British cannon fire and he was rowed by crew to the Niagara, which became his second flagship of this battle.

The battle of Lake Erie is the battle after which Hazard declared, after capturing the entire British squadron, "We have met the enemy and they are ours." This decisive battle prevented the Brit-


ish from entering the Northwest Territories via the St. Lawrence River and the Great Lakes.



Shelby J. Schait, the donor of the USS Niagara ship model, is an Ozaukee County resident with deep roots in Port Washington. Her great-great grandfather, Hilger Altendorf, along with his parents and siblings, immigrated from Germany in 1845. Hilger purchased 37.66 acres in the vicinity of Dixie Road north of the present City of Port

Washington in 1848 and farmed there until sometime in 1870. The rest of the family also settled in Ozaukee County.

Shelby's late husband, Arthur E. Schait, built the Niagara



It took Arthur eight years to build the model of the brig Niagara. A brig is a two-masted sailing ship, square rigged on both masts. Although Arthur chose not to include sails on the model, his detail on the standing rigging is exceptional. His attention to detail is evidenced by the inclusion of deck hands on the deck of the ship.

Included with the donation of the model are the transparent case, the table, the model kit instructions, plans for the model construction, and a photograph of the replica of the USS Niagara taken in Port Washington in 2008.

### WHAT IF STANFORD STAYED IN PORT?

After being admitted to the bar in 1848, Leland Stanford arrived in Port Washington to begin his career as a lawyer in the new state of Wisconsin. Twenty-four years old and fresh out of law school, he was prepared to set up his practice in Port Washington in Washington County (not yet Ozaukee County) with Wesley Pierce. His father presented him with a fine law library. After his arrival in the village of Port Washington,

Leland made several purchases of properties in the South Addition, the North East Addition, and the Original Plat where his law office and home were located. In those first years, like many entrepreneurs, he bought properties and sold them for profit.




On September 30, 1850, Stanford married Jane Elizabeth Lathrop in Albany, New York.


Popular thought is that Stanford's law office and home were located at what was 113 Main Street, Port Washington, in 1850. However, there is no recognized evidence to substantiate this. Property transfers from the Ozaukee County Register of Deeds office indicate the purchase of this property in 1850 and the sale of the property in 1852 when the Stanfords left the area for California.

There are conflicting documents and related stories as to the actual location of Stanford's law office. At the time of the fire in 1852 it appears that his office was on the second floor of the building on lot 2 in the middle of what is now the 100

block on the west side of Franklin Street. Regardless, Stanford left an impression on the city with one of the streets named in his honor.

An excerpt from "Parental Stories" by Cigrand in the 1916 issue of the *Port Washington Star* explains how Leland Stanford made a name for himself in California:





Stanford. When he was yet in his twenties he took up the study of law. It was his ambition to become district attorney of old Washington county, but was overwhelmingly defeated by the brilliant Eugene Turner. There were three reasons why Stanford soon left Port Washington, he was defeated for district attorney, he lost his library in a fire, and failed in winning most of his cases. The last case he tried before Judge Hopewell Coxe the judge said: "Stanford, that was a good speech, but contained no law." When court had adjourned Stanford brought his hand down on a law book and said he "Would not plead another case in this neck of the woods. He was utterly disappointed, either with himself or the county,





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### MARITIME HERITAGE FESTIVAL

**August 15<sup>th</sup> – August 17<sup>th</sup>, 2014** 

This year's event, to be held in the new Coal Dock Park, features the tall ship *Peacemaker* offering deck tours, a Coast Guard vessel, and "Coastie" the Coast Guard robot, as well as restored and handcrafted wooden boats and all the other activities of past years. A new feature is the Land Regatta Run/Walk on Saturday morning, sponsored by the Jaycees. The Cardboard Boat Regatta, entertaining and thrilling as always, is sponsored by the Yacht Club, and scheduled for Saturday afternoon. And speaking of thrilling, a Ferris Wheel will offer some new views of the shoreline and the city.

PWHS will present storyboards along the route of the Land Regatta with pictures and stories of the past at various locations. 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and prepared to leave Port Washington to its fate. He was very poor, even at the time when his marriage took place, and his ambition to go to California was only realized by borrowing money for the venture. Out on the Pacific coast he soon leaped into political prominence, and became very wealthy. In 1860, he came to Chicago as a delegate to nominate Abe Lincoln for president. Later he became personal advisor to Lincoln in regard to the building of the

central Pacific railroad, and was chosen its president in 1861, the same year he was elected governor of California. He superintended the construction of the transcontinental railroad over the mountains and drove the last spike at Promotory Point, Utah, in 1869. In 1885, he was elected United States Senator from California. In honor of his son he founded Leland Stanford University.

At least Port Washington can claim four years of Stanford fame.



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
