ANCHOR FROM NORTHERNER



The schooner *Northerner* was built in 1850 at Clayton, New York, and sold to Nicholas Ronk and Andreas Ryerson in 1865. While loading cordwood at the village of Amsterdam, 12 miles north of Port Washington, she struck bottom and was damaged. The leaking *Northerner* was towed into Port Washington and her deck load unloaded.

Taken in tow for Milwaukee by the steamer *Cuyahoga*, the *Northerner* capsized and sank in 135 feet of water five miles southeast of Port Washington. The anchor of the

Northerner was obtained by the Port Washington Historical Society this summer and returned to Port Washington, her last port of call. The anchor sits on the lawn of the 1860 Lighthouse.

PORT EXPLOREUM CAPITAL COMPAIGN TOPS TWO MILLION DOLLARS

Who said this couldn't be done? Well in truth, I heard this from many in our community. I was told that people here are tight – that they are still rubbing their first two nickels together – that there are too many fund drives going on – that the Society just finished up a campaign to restore and renovate the Resource Center – all reasons why that much money would never be donated

Well, our Capital Campaign Cabinet didn't buy into those thoughts. Time after time they had seen the generosity of our community in funding so many worthwhile causes. Led by our campaign chair, Melissa Suddendorf, as of September 19, \$2,075,362.14 has been received in cash donations, stock transfer, and pledges. And now, there is only another \$325,000 to go.

I know some of you will remember that this started out as a \$2,300,000 campaign. Lately we have experienced some additional construction expenses, and the cost of the marvelous content and interactive technology is stiff. The exciting story of our content and technology is that we will have an experience not found in any other museum in the country.

The Port Exploreum will truly be a special addition to our city – one to be enjoyed by families, seniors, and visitors alike.

So how did this \$2,075,362.14 to date ever occur? While we have had so many generous donors, I want to highlight two.

The first is our wonderful philanthropist Shirli Flack. From the beginning, year after year, Shirli has been the Society's strongest supporter providing the funds, her ideas, and the house on Grand Avenue which served as our home for five years.

Many of you know of her donation of \$150,000 for the Exploreum. But I am sure that many of you don't know that at a birthday party for Doug McManus, during which I made a presentation for the Exploreum, Shirli offered to match all Exploreum donations made at that party. Over \$16,000 was donated or pledged that evening. Shirli not only matched but also rounded up her gift to \$20,000.

When you see Shirli, please thank her for all she does, not only for the Society, but for all she does for our community.

Another organization with a long history of giving



throughout Southeastern Wisconsin is the Charter Manufacturing Company Foundation and the Mellowes family. They practice personal philanthropy and understand corporate responsibility to support the communities where their employees reside. Their gift of \$105,000 is greatly appreciated.

The Maritime Level of the Exploreum, with its interactive experiences for families and children, will be named for Shirli. Charter Steel Manufacturing Foundation and the Mellowes family will receive the naming rights for our second level.

I would ask each of you to now join Shirli, Charter Steel and the Mellowes family with a gift that is meaningful to you personally. While we have come so far in our campaign, there is still a ways to go—reasons to give—325,000 reasons to go.

For all who have given, thank you for you generosity. Walk by the Exploreum. The façade is almost completely restored. The interior is 85% completed. By mid October the building should be complete and ready for the next phase of 4-½ months to install the technology and the content. Then seven weeks of testing and training are scheduled to be sure it is right for our opening on April 21, 2015.

Two last and very positive announcements — Missy Larson has joined the Advisory Board to help with membership. And we now have our first paid employee. Wayne Chrusciel is our Interim Executive Director of the Exploreum. Welcome aboard, Missy and Wayne.

MARITIME HERITAGE FESTIVAL 2014

This was the first year that the MHF Committee ventured into the festival weekend without the support of any city group. All funding was raised through the efforts of hard working committee members, who were able to establish a 501(c)(3) status allowing sponsors an enhanced tax deduction for their contributions.

It was also the first time the event was held out in the Coal Dock Park with a Ferris wheel offering views of the city and the harbor. The tall ship, *Peacemaker*, was available for deck tours.

With a limited budget and time frame, the event was well received by those who attended. Plans are already moving forward toward a 2015 event on the third August weekend, 14-16, 2015.

Once again there was good participation for PWHS. With limited exposure on the festival grounds, the Resource Center at 205 N. Franklin St. was busy offering new maritime exhibits, and the Light Station shared the 1860 Lightkeeper's experience with many visitors. These stops were enhanced by the support from Johnson Bus taking visitors to both locations and stopping at the Resource Center as their downtown drop-off location.

Storyboards of past views of various locations were

placed throughout the course of the new Saturday Land Run/Walk Regatta event, which encompassed the harbor area.

Thank you to all who helped in 2014. I hope there will be continued support of the event by the entire community. It is volunteer enthusiasm that makes it happen.

The opening of the Exploreum in 2015 will add excitement to the city and the event. The mission of the Society to preserve the heritage of this fine city continues.

Volunteers needed for the Light Station and Resource Center:

Light Station:

Guides are needed to lead small groups through the Port Washington 1860 lighthouse. Information and training are provided. The lighthouse is open Friday, Saturday, and Sunday afternoons June through October.

Two to four guides are needed on a given day. Guides are requested to be available two or, if possible, more days a month. It's a great opportunity to meet visitors to the community.

Resource Center:

The building is open Monday, Thursday, and Friday 1-4 and Saturdays 10-2, Spring through Fall. Greeters are needed in the exhibit areas to answer questions and supervise the first floor areas and gift shop. Training is provided. Archive work can be done when there are no

guests in the building.

Cleaning the building once a week is needed: vacuum carpet and wood floors, dust exhibit areas, clean the bathroom, and occasionally clean windows. You can pick a task:

Archive work: photocopy articles and photos, file photocopied pieces, catalog information on collections, and fulfill research requests.

Database work: maintain databases for filing cabinets, shelves, and collections.

Special Event Planning: help create, organize, and stage a summer or fall event.

Video recording: assist in recording oral history interviews.


Accomplishing the purchase of properties and renovations of two buildings on Franklin Street through gen-

JUMBO SUGAR COOKIES

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 eggs
- 2 cups flour
- 2 tsp cream of tartar
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 tsp salt

(to sprinkle on top:

1 tsp cinnamon and 2 Tbsp sugar)

Beat together 2 c. sugar & shortening until light and fluffy; beat in eggs. Add flour, cream of tartar, baking soda, and salt. Stir.

On lightly floured wax paper, form dough into 4 rolls, each 12" long. Cut into 1" slices. Dip tops in sugar and cinnamon mixture. Bake on greased baking sheet. at 375° for 12 minutes. Let stand 1 minute before removing. Makes 4 dozen.


