QUARTERLY PROGRAM: CHRISTMAS IN JULY

We are fortunate to have as our next quarterly program presenter, Rochelle Pennington, an award-winning newspaper columnist and bestselling author of ten books including *High-lighted in Yellow* (co-authored with H. Jackson Brown, #1 New York Times bestselling author), The Historic Christmas Tree Ship (as featured on national television), Christmas Gifts: Ten of the Greatest Ever Given, An Old-Fashioned Christmas, and more. Her work has been included in multiple bestselling series over the past two decades.



Pennington has written two books detailing one of the most well-known shipwrecks of the Great Lakes, Lake Michigan's Christmas Tree Ship, which delivered holiday evergreens to the citizens of Chicago each Christmas season before it was caught in the "Great Storm of 1912" and subsequently went to the bottom of the lake fully loaded with trees. The ship is still loaded with its cargo today

and is a popular Great Lakes dive site.


"It is a story which exemplifies the best of humanity," said Pennington. "At its heart we find courage, love, generosity, heroism, and the importance of family. The moment I first heard the story of the Christmas Tree Ship, I understood why it had endeared itself to so many people over the years and was still being shared a century later. The ship's final voyage was not to the bottom of the lake but into the pages of history."

The true account of Captain Schuenemann and his schooner is considered the "most loved story of the Great Lakes" over the past century. The story has inspired paintings, poems, six different Christmas Tree Ship songs, television programs, a musical performed all over the country titled "The Christmas Schooner," and a new Christmas Tree Ship sailed by the Great Lakes Coast Guard each holiday season as a living memorial.

Several of us have experienced the performance of the "The Christmas Schooner" at Memories right here in Port Washington.

Pennington's initial book on the ship, *The Christmas Tree Ship: The Story of Captain Santa*, is an all-age summary of the story and includes vintage photographs complemented by the nautical artwork of famed painter Charles Vickery.

Pennington's follow-up documentary book, *The Historic Christmas Tree Ship: A True Story of Faith, Hope and Love*, is a 325-page expansion of the story and examines the legendary ship from every angle. The book includes



more than 60 photographs, along with hundreds of citations from century-old newspaper clippings spanning a period of 140 years.

Pennington's power-point presentation includes many of the century-old photographs of Captain "Santa" Schuenemann, his family, and his ship. In addition, she will bring several artifacts along with her to share with the audience including an axe used to chop trees down,

Dear Members,

As we near six months in the Resource Center, those of us that work in the building are pleased with how it is accommodating our needs. It is especially so as we work on different projects at the same time whether we are on the first or second floor. Our location on Franklin Street has made a huge difference in foot traffic that comes in the door on a weekly basis. Recently several donors have stepped forward to provide funds for the renovation of the façade. We are grateful for their generosity. Watch as our face on Franklin Street changes over the coming months.

With the completion of the work on the Resource Center, the focus will shift this summer to developing a local history museum. The addition of a museum to the city was something that was suggested by residents in a 2005 community study. Plans have been evolving over the past year. The former bank building, built in 1907 by Henry and Hill, will house that local history museum and will be a wonderful addition to the downtown. With new businesses locating in the city, the rebirth of the Boerner building, and the renovation of the Resource Center façade, the downtown is taking on a rejuvenated look.

On June 16 Afterglow Farm hosted *Spring in Bloom*, a rare opportunity for all that attended. The turnout far exceeded expectations with beautiful gardens and a lovely day. A huge thank you to Jean Schanen, Heidi Janous, and their committee and volunteers for all their hard work in planning and carrying out this fundraiser. Our gratitude is extended to the Uihlein family and the Afterglow staff for sharing their lovely spot of heaven.




In January of 2013, the Society moved into its new location at 205 N. Franklin Street, having completed renovations on the inside of the building. This completed phase I and II of the project and cost approximately \$184,000.

Phase III will consist of repair to the upper façade, relocation of the door to the center, replacement of windows, and the creation of a 1910 storefront look. Costs will total approximately \$50,000.

Donations to Phase III will make possible the façade renovation later this summer. Every effort will be made to have an entrance open onto Franklin Street during construction.



Volunteers have begun the task of cataloging and preserving the photos so that they can be shared with visitors to the Resource





Center.

MUSEUM ADVISORY BOARD REPORT

Many of you may have read the recent *Ozaukee Press* article regarding the most generous gift of Ambrose P. Mayer's extensive collection of historic Port Washington photographs and memorabilia. Mayer's daughter Jeanne Mayer donated the collection to the society, which her father helped found.

The *Press* article detailed the gift stating that "the collection includes several tubs of scrapbooks filled with photos, roughly 40 pictures in old frames and memorabilia — ink blotters from businesses like Bode's Sinclair Service and Port Washington State Bank, caps from Werking's Dairy, a coin purse from Ewig's House of Music and a key chain from First National Bank of Port Washington."

Gifts such as this will be incredibly important to the success of the Society's upcoming museum. They help us tell the history of Port, and especially the stories of those who built this community.

The creation of our museum continues to move forward. Architectural drawings for the building's renovation and restoration have been completed. Plans for a capital campaign are in motion. Work is starting on educational programming. Marketing and membership growth plans are in the works.

The success of each of these initiatives will build a foundation for this new treasure of a museum in Port. However, what is really important in the long run will be the experience that is created for the visitors. Gifts such as the Mayer collection will make the experience relevant and the stories we tell authentic.

dishes, a medicine bottle, a spittoon, a clay pipe, an ornament carved from one of the first Christmas trees raised from the ship in 1971 when the vessel was discovered, and an actual Christmas tree from the cargo. Underwater photos of the ship with its trees still visible in the cargo area are included with the program as well.

Her books will be available for sale the night of the program with profits going to the Port Washington Historical Society. Marc and Grace Eernisse are sponsoring Rochelle Pennington's program.

The Quarterly Meeting will be held Wednesday, July 17, in the Wilson House Community Room, provided by the Port Washington State Bank. MARITIME HERITAGE FESTIVAL 2013

August 23rd, 24th, and 25th

Spread the word about another great Maritime Heritage Festival on the shores of this city with a rich history of Lake Michigan. This is the year to stress our heritage - schooners sailing in to settle our shores with immigrants and goods, fishing vessels creating an industry, and memories of coal boats docking with their delivery of tons of coal.

Tall ships will not be present this year. Featured are one of the newer 45' Coast Guard cutters and the fishing vessel Susie Q. Both will have deck tours for the public. The Lakeside Spirit will offer harbor tours, "Another First View of the City" for those who approach from the 2547, or at the office, water. It will feature reasonably priced tours throughout the festival with narratives explaining the full history of Port Washington.

Once again the cardboard box regatta will host a variety of vessels crafted out of cardboard, duct tape, paint and glue—to race or to sink—to a cheering crowd of onlookers. Check the times, as the races are featured both Saturday and Sunday.

The Society will engage the local merchants with participation in a contest to match up a display, a picture of an anchor or a tug replica, with their location. We are making it a family walk through the downtown to engage the merchants with the festival, the suggested prize Festival Chair to be Downtown Dollars to spend downtown.

There will be a presence on the grounds in the Educational tent at Rotary Park as we did last year. It was good PR for the Society. The Light Station will be open for tours as will the Resource Center (facade remodeling permitting).

This is your Society presenting the history of the city. As always volunteers are needed to help with the event. Please think about spending a few hours at the Light Station as a greeter (no experience needed), out on the festival grounds, or at the Resource Center. We need you, and your help is greatly appreciated.
